### **Guest Speaker Jude Sutharshan**

On August 19 Jude Sutharshan gave an inspiring talk on the topic "Peace in Our Violent Times: An Interfaith dialogue" at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Owensboro.

His work has been in developing interfaith dialog & understanding in his war torn country of Sri Lanka. His father was Hindu, his mother Catholic, and they lived next door to a Norwegian Pentecostal orphanage. In his mid-teens he was taken by the Tamil rebels to become a soldier. Fortunately, the director of the orphanage was able to get him back. Jude wanted to help and became a Red Cross volunteer on the front lines. There he saw the pain of war and how it only increases the violence.

He deeply wanted to help heal his country and community and becoming a minister was the best way that he could help make positive changes. Liberation theology as practiced in South America was an inspiration to him. He has focused his ministry on human rights, peace building, and conflict resolution with a longterm commitment.

Although he acknowledges the assistance of international groups, he has come to realize that only grassroots activity can effectively address their problems. He has worked to draw together various ethnic and religious local leaders and helped them to make a longterm commitment, build right relations, and work for reconciliation. His country has seen 30 years of war and Jude expects it will take at least 30 years of work to bring real peace to the people.

Jude is developing a comprehensive program for rebuilding peace at the grassroots level in his country. The ability to foster interfaith dialog is an essential component of that plan.
