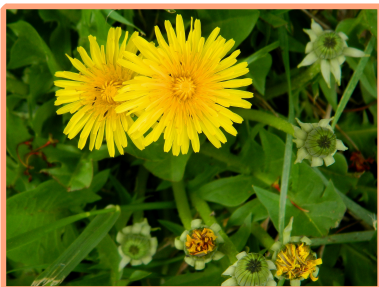

## ANNUAL MEETING NEWS

The Annual Meeting was held on 26 April immediately following service. Reports were

offered by the President of the Board, the Chair of Congregational Life, the Treasurer, and the Minister. Printed copies of these reports were distributed and are posted in the sanctuary.

The new Board was elected: President, Tom Hicks; Vice-president, Linda Craig; Secretary, DuWayne Keenan; Members-at-large, Scott Payne and Claud Porter. We are grateful for your willingness to serve the Congregation in leadership positions!

Thank you, to Eleanor Gray-Coe for your Board work this past year. Thank you, to Helen Bea, Rebecca Hopkins, and Maude Earhart for service to the Congregational Life Committee this past year. We are appreciative of your efforts and investment in UUCO.

A proposal was made to take the final steps to become a Welcoming Congregation. The action steps and significance of this designation were discussed. With an affirmative vote by the assembly, we have just two things left to do: Complete the educational component (watch

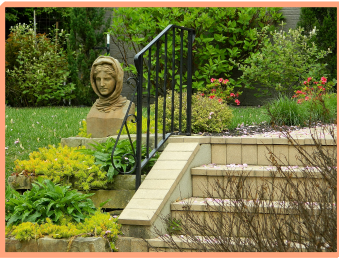
for details on when this will be scheduled) and file the application. We hope to have this done before Coming Out Day in October.

Programming projections for 2015-16 were unveiled. The plan includes several events that are now part of UUCO's identity (e.g. MLK Coffeehouse, Denounce Torture events,) a new retreat/workshop series entitled, "Life Is Sacramental," and a short series of Book Discussions. New programs will be offered to the general public for a fee; members and friends of UUCO will get a special rate.

The This Little Light Grant recipient was named, the project described, and our grant intention affirmed. This year's grantee is Working Hands, an organization offering short term help to working families experiencing a "gap" due to an emergency situation. Such families usually don't qualify for assistance--and usually don't need long-term support.



We offer a special thanks to Tom Hicks for keeping everything going while Claudia was on Sabbatical. It is because members continue to "step up," that we continue to operate! But it is because of goodwill while "stepping up" that we are poised to begin our new year with firm hope and glad anticipation!



## INTERFAITH MOMENT: NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

The National Day of Prayer has been designated by the United States Congress. 36 U.S.C. § 119 says: "The President shall issue each year a proclamation designating the first Thursday in May as a National Day of Prayer on which the people of the United States may turn to God in prayer and meditation at churches, in groups, and as individuals." The modern law formalizing its annual observance was enacted in 1952, although earlier days of fasting and prayer had been established by the Second Continental Congress from 1775 until 1783, and by President John Adams in 1798 and 1799.

The official designation is not to be confused with the National Day of Prayer Task Force which is an evangelical Christian organization that dominates the celebration in many areas. In fact, the Task Force is coordinating a local event at the Courthouse again this year. This event on 7 May includes a complete reading of the Bible and begins at 11:30 am.

In contrast, the American Humanist Association protests the National Day of Prayer. They are pursuing a designation for the first Thursday in May as a National Day of Reason. Several states will have events on this theme this year. If no event is nearby, the AHA recommends doing community service on that day.

As we have done for several years, our Thursday evening Meditation on 7 May will be dedicated to offering goodwill and encouragement for national leaders and for our country using prayers and reflections from many traditions--including Humanism. Whether you are able to attend one of these events or not, please surround with attention and blessing the needs of our nation and its leadership.
