

"THIS LITTLE LIGHT" COMMUNITY MINI-GRANT

"THIS LITTLE LIGHT" GRANT COMMITTEE

It's time to form the Grant Committee and solicit applications for our This Little Light community mini-grant. The committee is to be composed of three voting members, President-Elect, and Minister. The three members are drawn by lot from names submitted at Worship on the First Sunday of January. This year's drawing will be on 3 January.

"THIS LITTLE LIGHT" GRANT VISION

The Grant Application Packet is available through our website. Projects should address one of these issues in a new way: Domestic Violence, Hunger, Homelessness, or Literacy. Preference will be given to projects that enhance the self-sufficiency of those served or that have an extended reach into the community. Preference will also be given to projects with sustainable or repeatable plans. Grants will not be given to "keep the lights on" for already established work.

The grant process was designed as part of a series with UUCO's Adult RE. Member and friends give **5 cents** a day or **\$18.25** a year to fund a \$500 grant to a project meeting our Grant Vision. [The Elvis bank by the sanctuary door is for donations to this effort. Checks for the entire amount should be clearly marked GRANT on the memo line.]

"THIS LITTLE LIGHT" COMMITTEE DUTIES

- To serve only until projects are chosen for presentation at the Annual Meeting (roughly two months from mid-February through mid-April.)
- To meet as a Committee between 16 Feb and 15 Mar to evaluate all applications.
- To choose up to 5 applicants who meet all criteria and invite them to an interview with the Committee between 16 Mar and 15 Apr.
- To submit its choice to the Congregation for Affirmation at the Annual Meeting in April.

INTERFAITH MOMENT: TWELVE DAYS OF CHRISTMAS & EPIPHANY

In the western Christian tradition, Jan. 6 is celebrated as Epiphany. It goes by other names in various church traditions. (E.g. Three Kings' Day) Because of differences in church calendars, mainly between the Eastern Orthodox and the western Catholic and Protestant traditions, both Christmas and Epiphany have been observed at different times in the past. Some Greek Orthodox Churches and related traditions still follow the older calendar and celebrate Epiphany as the Theophany on Jan. 19.

Epiphany is the climax of the Twelve Days of Christmas. Today the Twelve Days are usually counted from the evening of Dec. 25 until the morning of Jan. 6, which is the Twelfth Day. In following the older custom of counting the days beginning at sundown, the evening of Jan. 5th is the Twelfth Night.

In traditional Christian churches Christmas is celebrated as a period of time, a season, rather than just a day. For many Protestant church traditions, the season of Epiphany extends from Jan. 6 until Ash Wednesday, which begins the season of Lent leading to Easter. Other traditions, especially the Roman Catholic tradition, observe Epiphany as a single day in the Christmas Season, with the Sunday following Epiphany named the Baptism of the Lord as the conclusion of the Season.

The term epiphany means "to show" or "to make known." In Western churches, it remembers the coming of the wise men bringing gifts to visit the Christ child and "revealing" Jesus to the world as Lord and King. In some churches the day is celebrated with feasting including the baking of a special King's Cake.
