INTERFAITH MOMENT: NAVARATRI, 21-29 September

Navaratri (or Navratri), meaning nine nights, is a nine day long festival to celebrate the nine forms of Goddess Durga. People in India worship Durga for her 'Shakti' or power that made her conquer the buffalo demon Mahishasura that gave her the name 'the Annihilator of Mahishasura.' This festival represents victory of good over evil and through all its rituals and traditional celebrations, symbolizes the essence of conquering one's evils with the goodness of one's soul.

Navaratri is celebrated 4 times a year but each region has a special love for one of the seasons. Sharad (Autumn) Navratri is observed for nine nights starting on the first day of the bright half of Ashwin month (September/October) especially in Gujarat. On the 10th day, Dussehra is celebrated by burning an effigy of demon king Ravana who was killed by Durga's ardent devotee, Lord Rama. It is believed that Rama had worshipped Goddess Durga before heading towards Lanka, the kingdom of Ravana. Thus, the followers of Lord Rama, too, worship Durga during Navaratri.

Navraatri Fast and Rituals: Most devotees observe the Navaratri fast for all 9 days, having only a single meal during the day. That single meal is a traditional, specific diet of sago, potato and other such things. Instead of common salt, they make navratri food with rock salt. Some devotees don't even have food other than milk and fruits during these 9 days. Even those who do not fast abstain from non-vegetarian food, alcohol etc.

Sharad Navratri Puja has a set pattern for every day which is almost similar to Chaitra (Spring) Navaratri. On the 1stt day, a ghat (metal/ earthen pot) is established, meaning it is filled with water, flowers, mango leaves, rice, and coconut in red cloth tied with the red sacred thread. This is believed to invoke Goddess Durga. A clay pot, filled with soil and barley seeds sown into it, is also kept at the place of worship along with a representation of Durga. The seeds are watered each day while worshipping the Goddess. On the 9th day, a few barley sprouts are offered to the Goddesses and the rest are placed under a 'Peepal' tree. Each day fresh flowers and fruits are offered to the Goddess Parvati and Durga while aarti and bhajans are recited.
