Interfaith Moment Diwali. November 07

Diwali, known as the Festival of Lights, is a festival shared by Hindus, Sikhs, and Jains. There are many legends associated with Diwali, and the holy day has a special significance for each faith. From BBC Religions:

Concerning the Hindu celebration: The lamps are lit to help the goddess Lakshmi find her way into people's homes. They also celebrate one of the Diwali legends, which tells of the return of Rama and Sita to Rama's kingdom after fourteen years of exile.

Concerning the Sikh celebration: For Sikhs, Diwali is particularly important because it celebrates the release from prison of the sixth guru, Guru Hargobind, and 52 other princes with him, in 1619.

Concerning the Jain celebration: In Jainism it has special significance, as on this day in 527 BCE (according to Svetambara tradition) that Mahavira gave his last teachings and attained ultimate liberation.

No matter which faith you view Diwali from, or which legend you read that explains Diwali, it comes down to triumph and renewed hope. Taken in context with the tragedies suffered by faith communities in our country and across the world, a holy day of hope and triumph that is shared by many faiths (in essence, interfaith) is the perfect one to examine during Faith Fest.

Events at 1UU

We will be hosting several events at IUU this Faith Fest. From open houses and prayer services, to performances and presentations, we will be quite busy. Please come check them all out and consider volunteering your time to help make sure they run smoothly.

November 5th, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., we will be hosting a special presentation by a speaker from the Kentucky Poor People's Campaign. This event is cosponsored by Nonviolent Owensboro. November 11th we will be hosting an open house for ourselves and local faith communities that do not have a permanent structure. These would be the Bahai, Earth-Based traditions, and Owensboro Humanists. The open house runs from 1:30 to 4:00 p.m. There will be a drum circle on November 12th, at 7 p.m. Bring your own drum, if you have one. No musical talent required.

Finally, we will have the honor of closing Faith Fest with an Interfaith Thanksgiving Prayer Service. This will be held Sunday, November 18, at 2:30 p.m. Bring a non -perishable food item to donate to the HELP office.

New Participating Communities

We welcome three new faith communities to the Faith Fest Tour of Faith Homes this year. Sunday, November 4th, the Tour opens, with First Presbyterian Church and Saints Joseph and Paul participating for the first time.
